
(Addendum 2)

To Whom It May Concern:

After reading over my initial statement I realize that I did not complete the information regarding how the money was handled at the end of the night. After I was done patting down the VIP hosts (as mentioned in the first letter) the money was then counted by Christian in the cash room. Being in the room on most of the counting, I had an opportunity to see the amount of money turned in and it usually exceeded \$10,000. At times it was less and at times it was more, the most I saw was \$22,000 turned in. The money was given to Greg Jamalowich who then put it in his briefcase at which point I would escort him to his vehicle. I also contributed tip money from security to him but I gave this to him separately, usually at his vehicle. At no time was I involved in actually counting the money and the money was never kept in the club, it was always taken away by Greg. At one point I did confront Greg and Frank about the tipping procedures as it was very uncomfortable to me but they told me it was none of my business.

On many occasions I would hear the VIP staff complain about how little money they got back in return. I actually had to be involved in terminating one VIP host because he was accused of not turning in all of his money. I also did this with two of the porters who were accused of not turning in all of their tips. I am not sure exactly how the money was divided up but I do know that the hosts would have to go to the office during the weekdays to get their envelope with their share of tips. All of this was very uncomfortable for me but because it was mandated by Greg and Frank, I was obligated to do it if I wanted to keep my job.
